Social DO'S and DON'TS in Ukraine

Ukrainian traditions of social behaviour don't differ too much from Western standards. An average Ukrainian perceives the world around them in just the same way as other Europeans do. However, every nation is unique and has a variety of national peculiarities in its lifestyle, public behaviour and etiquette.

GREETING PEOPLE

- Shaking hands is mostly done by men; women rarely, if ever, shake hands with each other. It is extremely inappropriate to shake hands with your gloves on in Ukraine, even when it's freezing cold.
- Hugging or kissing a friend or close acquaintance on the cheek is perfectly acceptable. When congratulating someone or if it is a special occasion, Ukrainians kiss each other on the cheek three times.



PAYING A VISIT

- Since Ukrainians do not normally wear shoes in their home, it shows good manners to leave your footwear at the entrance when you visit someone's home. Your host may offer you a pair of slippers so that you don't walk around barefoot.
 - It is always polite to bring a gift for your hosts. A drink, a cake or flowers are good ideas. Remember though: the bouquet you offer must have an odd number of flowers. According to Ukrainian belief, an even number of flowers is only given at funerals. If there is a young child in the house, a small gift for him or her as well will be highly appreciated.
 - Some things are thought to bring bad luck in Ukraine so you'd better avoid them when you're a guest at someone's house. Examples of these include shaking hands right over the threshold, opening an umbrella or whistling indoors.
